Building a Better homologying Experience



AN INTERVIEW WITH SYLVIA KASPAREK, VP OF CLIENT EXPERIENCE & WARRANTY

In far too many cases, buying a new home is a stressful experience. That's why Poetry Living is re-engineering the entire client experience. **Sylvia Kasparek** was brought on to form a new department whose entire purpose is to not merely serve customers, but to develop a process oriented around anticipating their needs and delivering on the builder's promises. We spoke with her about how she's doing that and what it means for Poetry Living homeowners.



- Q Tell me a bit about your background and how you landed in your current role.
- A I've been in the industry over 15 years now, but I've worked in customer service my whole life. Poetry Living has a flagship high-rise project CityPointe Heights that is up for occupancy and there was an opportunity to create a new client experience. I've been developing all of the systems, policies, and procedures, from the ground up.
- Q Could you explain in simple terms how this new initiative makes the experience better for buyers?
- We're trying to make sure the homeowner has the easiest transition possible. Right now, actually as we speak, we have staff members walking every single home at CityPointe Heights to verify that the homeowner's colour selections have been properly installed. From there, we do a "pre-PDI", which is essentially a quality control inspection done internally by our staff. After that, we hire a third-party inspector to go through the home with the homeowner.

Once the homeowner comes to pick up the keys, we do a move-in inspection. That's something that developers don't typically do. It ensures people feel comfortable with all the mechanical systems, including water shutoffs, anything like that. We also give them a tour of the building and answer any questions that they might have regarding warranty. It's a one-on-one experience that's about an hour long.

- Q I understand part of your role has been hiring the new client experience team. What does your ideal hire look like?
- A I always say I can train everything but a personality. As long as somebody is willing to learn, willing to grow, and is interested in the home warranty process and in making sure that homebuyers are satisfied, I can assist with everything else.
- **Q** Apart from the move-in inspection, is there anything unique about the way that Poetry Living does things from a client experience perspective?
- We look at every home as if it was our own. We could go based off the Tarion Home Warranty Guidelines (CPG) but we try to go above and beyond. And that is an instrumental mentality for each and every staff member.
- **Q** Which speaks to the culture at the company...
- A It starts from the top. We have weekly meetings together, where we brainstorm new ideas. We have email templates in order to ensure that we're delivering the same message over and over again. A big thing, too, is that we call it a "home." It's not a "unit." It's not a "suite." It's your home.

Somebody could be a tenant today, but a homeowner tomorrow. I have seen instances personally where people actually end up buying on the next project because they enjoyed the experience they had as a tenant and the quality of home we deliver.

- **Q** What is one impression that you want homeowners to take away from their experience?
- A That we genuinely care about how their home looks, their impression of us. You know, word of mouth is always the best advertisement, right? So our work is never done.
- **Q** What do you have planned for the future of the program?
- A There's a lot of new technology out there. We have implemented AI software at CityPointe Heights, so people have 24-7 support. We've developed the database of frequently asked questions, but the AI also learns based on the feedback it receives. We're constantly testing it. We're implementing new deficiency tracking technology as well. In this industry, the numbers don't lie. So not only the deficiency numbers, but the volume of emails, volume of calls those are all indications of what we can improve on.

Everything in our line of work is anticipating the next move of the homeowner. I'm anticipating what they're going to ask about, I'm anticipating their responses to make sure that we are already catering to them. I've also gone through multiple home purchases myself — I've bought from various developers — so I look at my experiences with them to see how I can perfect things.

- **Q** I am kind of curious about that. Have you ever had a really exemplary customer service experience? Or a really terrible one that has played a role in your work?
- A I haven't had exemplary. I've had mediocre. And I've witnessed friends and family have bad experiences. Developers have a real problem in setting the right expectations for the homeowner. Especially first-time homeowners they don't know what to expect when it comes to the warranty process.

For example, when there are deficiencies, there's a certain amount of time allotted to repair it. Sometimes deficiencies might not be rectified right away. It depends on the severity, depends on the orders, it depends on the shipments, depends on the manufacturing. We live in a society where everybody wants everything done yesterday, and we always try to do that. But if we're held back, really reinforcing the policies and making sure we set the right expectations makes the difference.



At Poetry Living, creating an exceptional client experience means communicating clearly, and showing genuine care every step of the way. Our team works closely with construction, sales, and décor teams to keep all aspects of the occupancy process organized, accurate, and customer focused. 

I want classic furniture made with good materials. I do not think this is too much to ask, but these days it seems to be harder and harder to find.

I just moved into a new home. In the time I've spent furnishing it, I've learned a lot about what I don't want. For example, I don't want furniture that I'm going to have to fix or replace in the next five years. I don't want to pay almost \$2,000 for a polyester rug because it's machine washable (you know how much spot cleaner I can buy with the \$800 I'll save?). I don't want to pay a massive premium for furniture from upscale brands that is well-made but costs twice as much as a similarly well-made piece from a retailer you've never heard of. I don't want to deal with brands whose price tags seem to have more to do with "white glove service" than the quality of their furniture. I do not need the benefits of a "club membership" to buy a couch that — I hope — I will not have to buy again for a while.



Just to be clear, I do believe there are certain times where retailers like Ikea or Wayfair, for example, can be the best option. Not everything has to be whittled out of cherrywood by a Mennonite (although, if you find something like this, you should seriously consider it). The problem is that we now default to the same handful of retailers for all our furniture. We all have the same ottomans, wardrobes, bed frames, sofas, and storage solutions. Quality and character have become casualties of convenience and cost.



Which brings us to online shopping. We all know selection can be limiting when shopping in person, and the vast virtual stockrooms of the internet have convinced us that we don't have to settle. We can find exactly what we want for a good deal. The problem is that you don't always get what you want online — or even what you ordered. How many times have you received an order only to find that the colour or size is slightly off, or the feel is flimsier and cheaper than expected? Shopping online is the great gamble. Sometimes you win. But how many returns are you willing to go through, or how many times are you willing to settle, before realizing that maybe buying everything online isn't the best bet?

So, what is the solution? In my experience, it involves doing a little extra legwork. Talk to family and friends about where they bought their favourite furniture and take your time to visit these places. We went to The Chesterfield Shop in Vaughan after a family member suggested it, and while the website isn't great, we had an amazing experience. Their pieces are hand-made in Toronto with solid wood frames and real down filling. Plus they had a massive showroom filled with a huge selection. We ended up buying a couch that looked exactly like the one we wanted from a high-end retailer but the quality was so much better for a fraction of the price.

There are so many retailers like this across the GTA. If you're feeling more adventurous, you can also find great pieces at estate or content sales. We found a hand-woven Persian rug at one of them for just \$100. Then there are antique stores, vintage markets, and other dealers: Housebound Interiors, A Room in Paris, Jacaranda Tree & Co., A Changing Nest, Aberfoyle Antique Market, and the four-floor antique market on the 400 in Innisfil. You may not find bed frames or couches but if you're looking for unique accent pieces, lighting fixtures, side tables, even wardrobes, tables or chairs, it's worth a visit. Facebook Marketplace, especially if you're willing to do a little refurbishing, is also worth your time. Sometimes the best way to know if a piece will last is to buy furniture that already has. Just remember to look at it in person before you commit to it.

Lastly, take your time. You don't need to live on a mattress on the floor, but for the key purchases, start looking early. Your home's style is built over months and years, not through a series of space-filling purchases.

Your Month-by-Month Guide to Furnishing Your New Condo

YOU DON'T HAVE TO BE HOUSEWARMING READY FROM THE MOMENT YOU MOVE IN — HERE'S WHAT YOU NEED RIGHT AWAY AND WHAT YOU DON'T.

One of the most stressful moving pieces (pun intended) of new condo ownership is deciding what to actually put in your new home; what you'll bring, what you'll buy, where you'll get it, and in what order.

A lot us feel like our new place should be housewarming-ready within the first week or so, but in our experience, furnishing is best done gradually. That's why we've created a checklist of what you'll need in the first three months, and a few tips to help you navigate this exciting time.

Before Your Occupancy: Plan Well

You can start developing a vision for your new place well before you move in. Browse through designs and key furniture pieces (see below). It's occasionally helpful to select a theme or design style to emulate. For example, if you're going for a contemporary look, you should probably stay away from that cozy floral armchair.





The First Month: The Starting Points

This first month is all about getting in the major pieces of furniture so you can live comfortably while you decide on the rest. These first pieces are the anchoring points for their respective rooms.

- Bedframe & Headboard
- Key Storage Elements (Wardrobes, etc.)
- Couch(es)


- Coffee & Side Tables
- Entertainment Consoles (TV stands, etc.)
- Dining Room Table & Chairs

WHAT IF I ALREADY HAVE MORE THAN THIS?

If you're picking up furniture from friends and family, or you find a second-hand item you love, of course you want to take advantage — in fact these pieces often have the most character, and become the anchoring pieces you build your décor around. You can also touch-up or refinish pieces, and with time you can phase out or replace pieces that don't work with the style you develop.


MEASURE & SKETCH

Use your floorplan to establish the dimensions of your condo. We recommend using a sketch to begin to establish where different pieces should go and what size they should be. Keep those dimensions handy. Always bring a measuring tape when furniture shopping. Scale in your new condo is key, and keeping track of your measurements is the first step in making sure your new furnishings fit properly.



SHOULD I PAINT BEFORE OR AFTER MOVING DAY?

If you're set with your key pieces of furniture and you're going with a neutral colour, then feel free to paint before moving day. Otherwise, we actually recommend you paint after you've moved these first pieces in. This way, you'll have a better idea of how everything will come together.



Once You're Done That: Complete the Look

After you have (at least) those first pieces and you've spent some time feeling out the space, you'll be ready to fill it in. Start with the medium sized pieces, then you can use the small accents (plants, pictures, pillows, blankets, etc.) to tie all the furniture together.

- Accent Tables (Ottomans, Additional Seating, etc.)
- Rugs
- Lamps & Lighting
- Artwork & Decorative Items (Plants, Pillows, Art Pieces, etc.)



A Few Design Tips: Balance, Scale, Texture

These are a few design principles that are often overlooked:

BALANCE

This is all about the visual weight of each piece and how it compares with the rest of the room. For example, if one side of your room has several pieces of furniture, but the other side is empty, the space will feel imbalanced. It doesn't just apply to furniture — you can adjust the balance of your coffee table decorations, accents, or wall art.



SCALE

Make sure to select pieces that are well-scaled to their respective rooms. A very large sofa will make a small living room feel even smaller. If a room doesn't feel quite right, scale might be the reason why.

TEXTURE

Texture is an element that many home decorators don't think about. You can contrast smooth leather surfaces with a fuzzy throw blanket, or juxtapose glossy metals with rough, wooden accents. Playing around with texture will add a new dimension to the look and feel of a space.





JULIA CHILD'S COQ AU VIN

Julia Child revolutionized American cuisine by making niche French recipes approachable for the home chef. Her cog au vin — tender, braised chicken simmered in a velvety red wine sauce, enriched with crisp bacon and aromatic herbs and vegetables — is the epitome of rustic French comfort food; rich, deeply savoury, and elegant enough to impress anyone at your table.


INGREDIENTS

- 4 Ounces of Thick-Cut Bacon
- 2 Tbsp of Unsalted Butter
- 2 ½ Pound Chicken (or 4 Thighs and 4 Drumsticks)
- 1/2 Tsp Salt
- 1/8 Tsp Pepper
- 3 Cups Red Wine
- 2 Cups of Chicken Stock
- 1/2 Tbsp Tomato Paste
- 2 Cloves of Garlic
- 1/4 Tsp Thyme Leaves
- 12-24 Pearl Onions
- 1/2 Pound of Mushrooms
- 3 Tbsp of All-Purpose Flour
- 2 Tbsp Softened Butter
- Fresh Parsley Leaves

Begin cutting your bacon into lardons and cooking in hot butter until browned. While that's cooking, wash your chicken and pat it dry all over. Season with salt and pepper and brown it in the hot fat that was left from the bacon for a few minutes. Deglaze your pan with wine — the original recipe also calls for brandy, which you flambé if you're feeling fancy — then, once the alcohol smell is gone, cover with stock. Stir in tomato paste, garlic, onions, herbs, and cooked bacon lardons and simmer. When nearly complete, sautée your mushrooms in butter for 4-5 minutes. After 30 minutes, remove your chicken and veggies and place with your mushrooms in a casserole dish. Let the remaining cooking liquid reduce for 5-10 minutes. Then, whip together your butter and flour into a smooth paste and stir it into your reduced cooking liquid until the sauce coats the back of a spoon. Pour your sauce over your chicken and veggies, garnish with parsely, and serve with potatoes or crunchy baguette.





JOEL ROBUCHON'S POMMES PURÉE

Named "Chef of the Century" in 1989, there are few chefs more iconic than Joël Robuchon, and there are no recipes more iconic than his pommes purée. Far from your average mashed potatoes, this incredibly rich and velvety side has become a staple in Michelin-starred restaurants the world over. Despite its haute-cuisine reputation, it's surprisingly easy to make at home. It's all in the technique.

INGREDIENTS

- 2 Pounds of Ratte Potatoes
- 1 Pound of Butter
- 3/4 Cups of Full-Fat Milk

METHOD

Boil the potatoes in their skin for 20 minutes, then allow them to cool slightly before peeling. Pass the potatoes through a ricer and then, for an extra silky texture, a fine drum sieve. Repeat a second time to replicate Robuchon's technique. Warm your milk and butter and fold into your potatoes until they reach the desired consistency. You'll never look at mashed potatoes the same.

ANTHONY BOURDAIN'S MORTADELLA SANDWICH

Anthony Bourdain's mortadella sandwich is a perfect encapsulation of his philosophy about food: that the most unforgettable dishes are often the simplest. This sandwich is the type of dish that Bourdain celebrated wherever he travelled, not because it was fancy, but because it was authentic and, of course, delicious.

INGREDIENTS

- ½ Pound of Sliced Mortadella
- Provolone Cheese
- Mayonnaise
- Dijo
- Sourdough or a Kaiser Roll

METHOD

Fold the mortadella slices on top of each other and fry in stacks of two in a pan until a golden crust develops around each. Once the crust appears, flip each slice and place your provolone on top and cover to melt. Spread the mayo and mustard on your toasted slices of bread, and serve warm.

MARCELLA HAZAN'S BOLOGNESE

There is no dish that more perfectly captures the spirit of homestyle Italian cooking than Marcella Hazan's legendary bolognese. From the chef who popularized authentic Italian cooking techniques internationally, Hazan's recipes are known for their precision, simplicity, and deep respect for tradition. Her bolognese is a masterclass in these values. Unlike quick, tomato-heavy sauces, Hazan's bolognese is all about layering subtle flavours slowly.

INGREDIENTS

- 1½ Pounds of Pasta
- 1/2 Cup Chopped Onion
- 2/3 Cup Chopped Celery & Carrot
- 3/4 Pound Ground Beef
- 1 Cup Whole Milk
- 1 Cup White Wine
- 1½ Cups Plum Crushed Tomatoes
- Grated Parmigiano Reggiano Cheese

METHO

Sautée your onions in olive oil until softened, about 2 minutes, then add your celery and carrots, and cook for another 6 minutes. Add your ground beef, season with salt and pepper, breaking up the meat as it cooks until browned. Add your milk and simmer until absorbed. Next, add salt and white wine and cook until the wine evaporates. Stir in the crushed tomatoes and reduce the heat to a simmer, letting the sauce cook for around 3 hours, stirring occasionally. Cook your pasta to the package instructions or "al dente" (slightly firm, "to the tooth") if fresh, and combine with sauce and let it sit for a few moments before serving. Serve with plenty of freshly grated Parmigiano Reggiano.

Start by rimming your cocktail glass with granulated sugar. Then, in a cocktail shaker, fill with ice and combine ½ cup of apple juice, 1 tbsp simple syrup, and ½ tbsp lemon juice. Shake well until chilled, then strain into your rimmed glass. Garnish with crisp apple slices.



The Sweet Adeline

A more fragrant hot toddy stand-in

Pour 1/4 cup of pomegranate juice and 1 tbsp cinnamon syrup into a warm mug. Add an orange-and-spice tea bag to roughly 3/4 cup of hot water and steep according to the tea's instructions before removing the tea bag. Stir well and garnish with a cinnamon stick.



Cinnamon Pear Delight

Your next signature Autumn drink

Start by adding ¾ ounces of pear nectar, ½ ounce of cinnamon simple syrup, and ½ ounce of lemon juice to a shaker filled with ice. Proceed to shake until the outside of the shaker starts to feel cool. Strain into a rocks glass over fresh ice, top with 1 ounce of ginger ale, and garnish with a rosemary sprig and pear slices.
